Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL)

PRIMARY FUNDING SOURCE

Common nickname for the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)

\$1.2 trillion

Authorized for a wide variety of infrastructure, including about half for transportation.

5 years

Allocates funds for FY 2022 - 2026

400+ grants

Competitive program with more than 400 programs, over half of which will be awarded through nationwide competitive process



Safety

Safe transportation, especially where it can make the largest community impact



Modernization

New solutions and technology driving large improvements to transportation systems





Equity

Improve community connectivity and access to provide services where they are needed most



Climate & sustainability

Efficient projects that reduce congestion, emissions, or use sustainable energy solutions





- ✓ Mid-November due dates
- ✓ It is never too early to prepare

SMART Grants Program

Strengthening Mobility and Revolutionizing Transportation

- \$100M in grants annually for 5 years
- Fund projects that use data and technology to solve community challenges

ATTAIN Program

Advanced Transportation Technology and Innovation

- \$60M annually for 5 years
- Fund projects to improve safety and reduce travel times for drivers and transit riders



4 practical considerations to align with common themes

Tips for picking and aligning projects to increase your chances to win





Projects near hospitals or medical centers

Ask yourself...

- Equitable, safe access to medical care for all users, e.g., vehicles, transit, peds
- Is there a Level 1 hospital/trauma center located within the city? Does it serve a larger region?

- Transit signal priority
- Traffic flow/coordination
- Emergency vehicle preempt
- ADA accessibility
- Streetlights





Projects that assist with emergency preparedness or rebuilding

Ask yourself

- Have there been any major events in the last 10 years such as floods, earthquakes, or hurricanes?
- Are there any key evacuation corridors?
- What makes your city different in relation to safety or response?
- Could you reduce EV response times, especially in congested areas?

- Central traffic management system
- Congestion mitigation e.g., adaptive, traffic responsive
- Signs and sign control
- Video





Safety initiatives that reduce accidents and injuries

Ask yourself

- Do we have any accident-prone areas or crossings?
- Are there intersections with common knockdowns?
- What are our highly congested areas that translate to incidents?

- Traffic signal controller or software updates
- Adaptive signal control
- CV/SPaT solutions





Complete streets solutions with bike & ped focus

Ask yourself

- Are there areas where cyclists/peds share space on high-volume roads?
- Would improved street safety help people access more jobs?


- · Smart bike sensors
- Bike lanes
- Cycle signs/tracking
- Improved signal timing


Identifying disadvantaged areas

Projects in Areas of Persistent Poverty have increased odds of being funded.

These areas are defined as:

- County with ≥20% of the population living in poverty over last 30 years, OR
- Census Tract with a poverty rate of ≥20%, AND
- Located in the US

» Transportation disadvantaged census track






Identifying heavily polluted areas

Projects in areas of increased Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Emissions have better odds of being funded.

An AOR is an Authorized Organization Representative





5 steps for a better process


- 1. Decide on a strategy before you decide to apply
- 2. Assume the proposal will take longer than you think, plan accordingly
- 3. Record everything, communicate with everyone
- 4. Store everything in <u>one</u> central location
- 5. Define the roles and responsibilities of every team member



How to compete

Tips to take you over the finish line

- Don't do it alone create a winning team
- Tell a story
- Align your project with merit criteria
- Include data-driven, reasonable and justifiable outcomes
- Demonstrate a reasonable schedule and timeline


